Waives the requirement under rule XIII of the House of Representatives of a two-thirds vote to consider a Committee on Rules report on the same day it is presented to the House, with respect to any resolution reported by such Committee on May 24, 2001, providing for consideration or disposition of any measure to provide for reconciliation pursuant to H. Con. Res. 83 (FY 2002 congressional budget), including any amendment thereto, conference report thereon, or any amendment reported in disagreement from a conference thereon.
