Amends the Family and Medical Leave Act of 1993 (FMLA) to provide for employee leave to care for a domestic partner, parent-in-law, adult child, sibling, or grandparent if such person has a serious health condition.

Amends Federal civil service law to apply the same leave allowance to Federal employees.

Actions Timeline

- **Sep 18, 2001:** Referred to the Subcommittee on Workforce Protections.
- **Jul 9, 2001:** Referred to the Subcommittee on the Civil Service and Agency Organization.
- **Jun 21, 2001:** Introduced in House
- **Jun 21, 2001:** Referred to the Committee on Education and the Workforce, and in addition to the Committees on Government Reform, and House Administration, for a period to be subsequently determined by the Speaker, in each case for consideration of such provisions as fall within the jurisdiction of the committee concerned.
