Summary (as of Jan 31, 2001)

COLA Fairness Act of 2001 - Requires the Bureau of Labor Statistics of the Department of Labor to establish, for 14 specified regions in the United States, monthly regional consumer price indices for computation of cost-of-living increases for Social Security and Medicare (title XVIII of the Social Security Act) benefits.

Actions Timeline

- **Mar 15, 2001:** Referred to the Subcommittee on Employer-Employee Relations.
- **Feb 14, 2001:** Referred to the Subcommittee on Health, for a period to be subsequently determined by the Chairman.
- **Feb 9, 2001:** Referred to the Subcommittee on Social Security.
- **Feb 9, 2001:** Referred to the Subcommittee on Health.
- **Jan 31, 2001:** Introduced in House
- **Jan 31, 2001:** Referred to the Committee on Ways and Means, and in addition to the Committees on Energy and Commerce, and Education and the Workforce, for a period to be subsequently determined by the Speaker, in each case for consideration of such provisions as fall within the jurisdiction of the committee concerned.
