Crack-Cocaine Equitable Sentencing Act of 2001- Amends the Controlled Substances Act and the Controlled Substances Import and Export Act to eliminate specified mandatory minimum penalties relating to the trafficking in, and possession, importation, or distribution of, crack cocaine.

- **Mar 14, 2001:** Referred to the Subcommittee on Health, for a period to be subsequently determined by the Chairman.
- **Mar 2, 2001:** Referred to the Subcommittee on Crime.
- **Feb 14, 2001:** Introduced in House
- **Feb 14, 2001:** Referred to the Committee on the Judiciary, and in addition to the Committee on Energy and Commerce, for a period to be subsequently determined by the Speaker, in each case for consideration of such provisions as fall within the jurisdiction of the committee concerned.
