### Summary (as of Mar 25, 2003)

Pollution Accountability Act - Amends the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act of 1980 (CERCLA) to require the public availability of an accounting of funds used (or required to be used) in response to a release of a hazardous substance, pollutant, or contaminant.

### Actions Timeline

- **Apr 10, 2003:** Referred to the Subcommittee on Environment and Hazardous Materials.
- **Mar 26, 2003:** Referred to the Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment.
- **Mar 25, 2003:** Introduced in House
- **Mar 25, 2003:** Referred to the Committee on Energy and Commerce, and in addition to the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure, for a period to be subsequently determined by the Speaker, in each case for consideration of such provisions as fall within the jurisdiction of the committee concerned.
