Providing for consideration of the bill (H.R. 4513) to provide that in preparing an environmental assessment or environmental impact statement required under section 102 of the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 with respect to any action authorizing a renewable energy project, no Federal agency is required to identify alternative project locations or actions other than the proposed action and the no action alternative, and for other purposes, and for consideration of the bill (H.R. 4529) to provide for exploration, development, and production of oil and gas resources on the Arctic Coastal Plain of Alaska, to resolve outstanding issues relating to the Surface Mining Control and Reclamation Act of 1977, to benefit the coal miners of America, and for other purposes.

Sets forth the rule for consideration of H.R. 4513 (regarding alternative project locations for renewable energy projects) and H.R. 4529 (Arctic Coastal Plain and Surface Mining Improvement Act of 2004).

Actions Timeline

- **Jun 15, 2004:** Considered as privileged matter. (consideration: CR H3968-3973)
- **Jun 15, 2004:** DEBATE - The House proceeded with one hour of debate on H. Res. 672.
- **Jun 15, 2004:** POSTPONED PROCEEDINGS - With all time yielded back, the Chair put the question on ordering the previous question and by voice vote, announced that the ayes had prevailed. Mr. Hastings of Florida demanded the Yeas and Nays and pursuant to the rule, the Chair postponed further proceedings on the consideration of H. Res. 672 until a later time.
- **Jun 15, 2004:** Considered as unfinished business. (consideration: CR H3980-3981)
- **Jun 15, 2004:** On ordering the previous question Agreed to by the Yeas and Nays: 221 - 198 (Roll no. 238). (consideration: CR H3973, H3980)
- **Jun 15, 2004:** Passed/agreed to in House: On agreeing to the resolution Agreed to by recorded vote: 226 - 193 (Roll no. 239).(text: CR H3968-3969)
- **Jun 15, 2004:** Motion to reconsider laid on the table Agreed to without objection.
- **Jun 15, 2004:** On agreeing to the resolution Agreed to by recorded vote: 226 - 193 (Roll no. 239). (text: CR H3968-3969)
- **Jun 14, 2004:** Introduced in House
- **Jun 14, 2004:** The House Committee on Rules reported an original measure, H. Rept. 108-540, by Mr. Reynolds.
- **Jun 14, 2004:** Rule provides for consideration of H.R. 4513 and H.R. 4529 with 1 hour of general debate. Previous question shall be considered as ordered without intervening motions except motion to recommit with or without instructions. Measure will be considered read. A specified amendment is in order.
- **Jun 14, 2004:** Placed on the House Calendar, Calendar No. 185.
