**(This measure has not been amended since it was introduced. The summary of that version is repeated here.)**

Directs the Secretary of the Interior to convey by quitclaim deed, without consideration and subject to valid existing rights, all right, title, and interest of the United States in and to a specified parcel of land to the town of Frannie, Wyoming.

Reserves any oil and gas rights for the United States. Revokes a special use permit and two Secretarial Orders issued by the Commissioner of Reclamation with respect to the land.
