Summary (as of Jul 14, 2005)

Government Reorganization and Improvement of Performance Act - Authorizes the President to: (1) propose establishment in the executive branch of one or more Results Commissions to improve the overall effectiveness, efficiency, or accountability of executive branch operations through reorganization; and (2) transmit such proposal to Congress for expedited consideration.

Actions Timeline

- **Sep 27, 2005:** Referred to the Subcommittee on Federal Workforce and Agency Organization.
- **Sep 27, 2005:** Subcommittee Hearings Held.
- **Jul 14, 2005:** Introduced in House
- **Jul 14, 2005:** Referred to the Committee on Government Reform, and in addition to the Committee on Rules, for a period to be subsequently determined by the Speaker, in each case for consideration of such provisions as fall within the jurisdiction of the committee concerned.
