Summary (as of Jul 28, 2005)

Surface Transportation Extension Act of 2005, Part VI - Extends, through August 14, 2005, the authorization of appropriations from the Highway Trust Fund (HTF) for: (1) administrative expenses for federal highway, highway safety, motor carrier safety, and transit programs; and (2) the Bureau of Transportation Statistics. Prohibits, after August 14, 2005, the obligation of funds for any federal-aid highway program project until enactment of a multiyear law reauthorizing the federal-aid highway program.

Amends the Internal Revenue Code to authorize until August 15, 2005, expenditures for obligations under the Transportation Equity Act for the 21st Century (TEA-21) from: (1) the HTF; (2) the Mass Transit Account; and (3) the Aquatic Resources Trust Fund.

Repeals upon enactment of the Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation Equity Act: A Legacy for Users a provision directing the Secretary of the Air Force to open the airfield at Malmstrom Air Force Base, Montana.

Actions Timeline

- **Jul 29, 2005:** Referred to the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure, and in addition to the Committees on Resources, Science, and Ways and Means, for a period to be subsequently determined by the Speaker, in each case for consideration of such provisions as fall within the jurisdiction of the committee concerned.
- **Jul 29, 2005:** Rules Committee Resolution H. Res. 401 Reported to House. Rule provides for consideration of H.R. 3514 with 10 minutes of general debate. Motion to recommit allowed. Measure will be considered read. Bill is closed to amendments.
