Summary (as of Dec 16, 2005)

Sodium Fluoroacetate Elimination Act - Amends the Toxic Substances Control Act to prohibit the manufacture, processing, possession, or distribution in commerce of sodium fluoroacetate (known as Compound 1080).

Directs the Secretary of Agriculture to: (1) provide for the collection and destruction of remaining stocks of sodium fluoroacetate; and (2) compensate those (excepting a federal agency) transferring sodium fluoroacetate to the Secretary within 18 months of enactment.

Amends federal criminal law to subject a person to fine or imprisonment for possession of sodium fluoroacetate.

Actions Timeline

- **Feb 16, 2006:** Referred to the Subcommittee on Crime, Terrorism, and Homeland Security.
- **Jan 24, 2006:** Referred to the Subcommittee on Conservation, Credit, Rural Development, and Research.
- **Jan 3, 2006:** Referred to the Subcommittee on Environment and Hazardous Materials.
- **Dec 16, 2005:** Introduced in House
- **Dec 16, 2005:** Referred to the Committee on Energy and Commerce, and in addition to the Committees on Agriculture, and the Judiciary, for a period to be subsequently determined by the Speaker, in each case for consideration of such provisions as fall within the jurisdiction of the committee concerned.
