Summary (as of Jan 26, 2005)

Congressional Gold Medal Enhancement Act of 2005 - Sets forth standards under which the Secretary of the Treasury, beginning on the date of the enactment of this Act, is authorized to strike not more than two congressional gold medals for presentation during any calendar year.

Provides that: (1) only an individual may be a recipient of a congressional gold medal; and (2) no gold medal may be presented posthumously on behalf of any individual except during the 20-year period beginning five years after the individual's death (unless the Act of Congress authorizing the striking of such medal was enacted before the death).

Actions Timeline

- **Jan 26, 2005:** Rule H. Res. 42 passed House.
- **Jan 26, 2005:** Considered under the provisions of rule H. Res. 42. (consideration: CR H206-216, H216-219; text of measure as introduced: CR H211)
- **Jan 26, 2005:** Rule provides for consideration of H.R. 54 with 1 hour of general debate. Previous question shall be considered as ordered without intervening motions except motion to recommit with or without instructions. Measure will be considered read. Specified amendments are in order.
- **Jan 26, 2005:** House resolved itself into the Committee of the Whole House on the state of the Union pursuant to H. Res. 42 and Rule XVIII.
- **Jan 26, 2005:** The Speaker designated the Honorable Ray LaHood to act as Chairman of the Committee.
- **Jan 26, 2005:** GENERAL DEBATE - The Committee of the Whole proceeded with one hour of general debate on H.R. 54.
- **Jan 26, 2005:** DEBATE - Pursuant to the provisions of H. Res. 42, the Committee of the Whole proceeded with 10 minutes of debate on the Oxley amendment.
- **Jan 26, 2005:** DEBATE - Pursuant to the provisions of H. Res. 42, the Committee of the Whole proceeded with 20 minutes of debate on the Crowley amendment.
- **Jan 26, 2005:** POSTPONED PROCEEDINGS - At the conclusion of debate on the Crowley amendment, the Chair put the question on adoption of the amendment and by voice vote announced that the noes had prevailed. Mr. Crowley demanded a recorded vote and the Chair postponed further proceedings on the question of adoption of the amendment until later in the legislative day.
- **Jan 26, 2005:** DEBATE - Pursuant to the provisions of H. Res. 42, the Committee of the Whole proceeded with 20 minutes of debate on the Crowley amendment.
- **Jan 26, 2005:** POSTPONED PROCEEDINGS - At the conclusion of debate on the Crowley amendment, the Chair put the question on adoption of the amendment and by voice vote announced that the noes had prevailed. - **Jan 26, 2005:** UNFINISHED BUSINESS - The Chair announced that the unfinished business was the question of adoption of amendments which had been debated earlier and on which further proceedings had been postponed.
- **Jan 26, 2005:** The House rose from the Committee of the Whole House on the state of the Union to report H.R. 54.
- **Jan 26, 2005:** The previous question was ordered pursuant to the rule.
- **Jan 26, 2005:** The House adopted the amendments en gross as agreed to by the Committee of the Whole House on the state of the Union.
- **Jan 26, 2005:** Mr. Crowley moved to recommit with instructions to Financial Services.
- **Jan 26, 2005:** DEBATE - The House proceeded with 10 minutes of debate on the Crowley motion to recommit with instructions. The instructions contained in the motion seek to require the bill to be reported back to the House forthwith with an amendment which inserts a new paragraph preventing the Secretary from striking a congressional gold medal for presentation posthumously on behalf of any individual except during the 20-year period beginning 5 years after the death of the individual (unless the Act of Congress authorizing the striking of such medal was enacted before the death of such individual).
- **Jan 26, 2005:** The previous question on the motion to recommit with instructions was ordered without objection.
- **Jan 26, 2005:** On motion to recommit with instructions Failed by the Yeas and Nays: 187 - 217 (Roll no. 12). (consideration: CR H216-218)
- **Jan 26, 2005:** Passed/agreed to in House: On passage Passed by recorded vote: 231 - 173 (Roll no. 13).
