Summary (as of Jun 25, 2007)

Alerting Localities of Environmental Risks and Threats (ALERT) Act - Requires the Administrator of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to promptly notify the governor of a state and/or the head of a local government whenever the Administrator (or the Attorney General) takes specified enforcement actions (including the issuance, settlement, or final determination of an administrative order or complaint) with respect to any environmental law violation in, or directly affecting, that jurisdiction.

Actions Timeline

- **Jun 26, 2007:** Referred to the Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment.
- **Jun 25, 2007:** Introduced in House
- **Jun 25, 2007:** Referred to the Subcommittee on Environment and Hazardous Materials.
- **Jun 25, 2007:** Referred to the Committee on Energy and Commerce, and in addition to the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure, for a period to be subsequently determined by the Speaker, in each case for consideration of such provisions as fall within the jurisdiction of the committee concerned.
