Summary (as of Jan 16, 2007)

Energy Policy Reinvestment Act of 2007 - Amends the Internal Revenue Code to repeal: (1) the expensing allowance for liquid fuel refineries; (2) accelerated depreciation for natural gas distribution and gathering lines; (3) expanded eligibility of small petroleum refiners for the exception to limitations on the oil and gas depletion allowance; and (4) accelerated amortization of geological and geophysical expenditures. Directs that any revenues resulting from these repeals be made available for certain hydrogen and fuel cell technology programs.

- Mar 20, 2007: Referred to the Subcommittee on Government Management, Organization, and Procurement.
- Feb 2, 2007: Referred to the Subcommittee on Energy and Air Quality.
- Jan 31, 2007: Referred to the Subcommittee on Energy and Environment.
- Jan 16, 2007: Introduced in House
- Jan 16, 2007: Referred to the Committee on Ways and Means, and in addition to the Committees on Science and Technology, Oversight and Government Reform, and Energy and Commerce, for a period to be subsequently determined by the Speaker, in each case for consideration of such provisions as fall within the jurisdiction of the committee concerned.
