Summary (as of Jul 29, 2010)

Support for Families of the Fallen Act - Increases the death gratuity paid with respect to a member of the Armed Forces killed in action by: (1) the total amount of social security taxes paid before and during such military service; and (2) any federal taxes paid on self-employment income.

Makes such increase payable through the Federal Old-Age and Survivors Insurance Trust Fund.

Actions Timeline

- **Sep 16, 2010:** Referred to the Subcommittee on Military Personnel.
- **Jul 29, 2010:** Introduced in House
- **Jul 29, 2010:** Referred to House Armed Services
- **Jul 29, 2010:** Referred to the Committee on Armed Services, and in addition to the Committee on Ways and Means, for a period to be subsequently determined by the Speaker, in each case for consideration of such provisions as fall within the jurisdiction of the committee concerned.
