False Travel Documents Prohibition Act of 2011 - Amends the federal criminal code to prohibit the production, transfer, possession, and use of false travel documents.

Directs the Assistant Secretary of Transportation for Transportation Security [sic] to provide recurring training to transportation security officers on methods to identify false travel documents and false identification documents.

### **Actions Timeline**

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- **Aug 25, 2011:** Referred to the Subcommittee on Crime, Terrorism, and Homeland Security.
- **Jul 20, 2011:** Referred to the Subcommittee on Transportation Security.
- **Jul 6, 2011:** Introduced in House
- **Jul 6, 2011:** Referred to the Committee on the Judiciary, and in addition to the Committee on Homeland Security, for a period to be subsequently determined by the Speaker, in each case for consideration of such provisions as fall within the jurisdiction of the committee concerned.
