112 HRES 475	Related bill	Dec 2, 2011: Referred to the Subcommittee on the Constitution.

Expresses the sense of the House of Representatives that: (1) the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (PPACA) is unconstitutional in its entirety, and (2) the Anti-Injunction Act does not apply to the penalty provision that enforces the individual mandate and thus does not preclude the federal courts from finding PPACA unconstitutional in its entirety.

- **Dec 2, 2011:** Referred to the Subcommittee on the Constitution.
- **Nov 18, 2011:** Referred to the Subcommittee on Health.
- **Nov 16, 2011:** Introduced in House
- **Nov 16, 2011:** Referred to the Committee on the Judiciary, and in addition to the Committees on Energy and Commerce, Ways and Means, Education and the Workforce, Natural Resources, House Administration, Rules, and Appropriations, for a period to be subsequently determined by the Speaker, in each case for consideration of such provisions as fall within the jurisdiction of the committee concerned.
