Summary (as of Dec 22, 2014)

Great Smoky Mountains National Park Agreement Act of 2014 - Directs the National Park Service (NPS) to transfer \$4 million to counties within Great Smoky Mountains National Park in accordance with the Memorandum of Agreement entered into by the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) and the Department of the Interior, dated February 2010, that supersedes the agreement of July 30, 1943.
