DHS IT Duplication Reduction Act of 2015

(Sec. 2) This bill directs the Chief Information Officer of the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) to report on:

- the number of information technology systems at DHS;
- the number of such systems exhibiting duplication or fragmentation (i.e., where there are two or more systems or programs that deliver similar functionality to similar user populations);
- a strategy for reducing such duplicative systems, including an assessment of potential cost savings; and
- a methodology for determining which system should be eliminated when there is duplication or fragmentation.

- **Apr 28, 2016:** Placed on Senate Legislative Calendar under General Orders. Calendar No. 454.
- **Jun 24, 2015:** Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs. Ordered to be reported without amendment favorably.
- **Jun 18, 2015:** Introduced in Senate
- **Jun 18, 2015:** Read twice and referred to the Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs.
