Summary (as of Jul 27, 2015)

This bill requires the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) to limit the total volume of cellulosic biofuel in transportation fuel under the renewable fuel standard to what is commercially available until the EPA submits to Congress a comprehensive study on cellulosic biofuel and the environmental and economic impacts of producing such fuel.

Actions Timeline

- **Aug 18, 2015:** Referred to the Subcommittee on Environment.
- **Jul 31, 2015:** Referred to the Subcommittee on Energy and Power.
- **Jul 27, 2015:** Introduced in House
- **Jul 27, 2015:** Referred to the Committee on Energy and Commerce, and in addition to the Committee on Science, Space, and Technology, for a period to be subsequently determined by the Speaker, in each case for consideration of such provisions as fall within the jurisdiction of the committee concerned.
