Stop Taxpayer Funded Settlements Act

This bill prohibits federal officials and employees from entering into settlements that provide for payment of attorney's fees by the federal government in cases brought under the Clean Air Act, the Federal Water Pollution Control Act (commonly known as the Clean Water Act), or the Endangered Species Act of 1973.

Actions Timeline

- **Mar 31, 2017:** Referred to the Subcommittee on the Constitution and Civil Justice.
- **Mar 17, 2017:** Referred to the Subcommittee on Environment.
- **Mar 14, 2017:** Referred to the Subcommittee on Water Resources and Environment.
- **Mar 13, 2017:** Introduced in House
- **Mar 13, 2017:** Referred to the Committee on the Judiciary, and in addition to the Committees on Transportation and Infrastructure, Natural Resources, and Energy and Commerce, for a period to be subsequently determined by the Speaker, in each case for consideration of such provisions as fall within the jurisdiction of the committee concerned.
