This bill addresses the protection of personal information by

- requiring entities to carry out security measures to protect the personal information they collect and maintain,
- limiting the collection and distribution of personal information,
- requiring specified notice with respect to certain security breaches,
- restricting targeted marketing to children, and
- otherwise modifying provisions relating to the collection and use of personal information of children or adults.
