Sets forth the rule for consideration of the bill (H.R. 2824) to amend title V of the Social Security Act to extend the Maternal, Infant, and Early Childhood Home Visiting Program; providing for consideration of the bill (H.R. 2792) to amend the Social Security Act to make certain revisions to provisions limiting payment of benefits to fugitive felons under titles II, VIII, and XVI of the Social Security Act.

Actions Timeline

- **Sep 26, 2017:** Considered as privileged matter. (consideration: CR H7499-7503)
- **Sep 26, 2017:** DEBATE - The House proceeded with one hour of debate on H. Res. 533.
- **Sep 26, 2017:** POSTPONED PROCEEDINGS - At the conclusion of debate on H. Res. 533, the Chair put the question on ordering the previous question, and by voice vote announced that the ayes prevailed. Mr. Hastings demanded the yeas and nays and the Chair postponed further proceedings on the question of ordering the previous question until later in the legislative day.
- **Sep 26, 2017:** Considered as unfinished business. (consideration: CR H7504-7505)
- **Sep 26, 2017:** UNFINISHED BUSINESS - The Chair announced that the unfinished business was the question on ordering the previous question and adoption of H.Res. 533, all of which had been debated earlier and on which further proceedings had been postponed.
- **Sep 26, 2017:** On ordering the previous question Agreed to by the Yeas and Nays: 230 - 189 (Roll no. 532). (consideration: CR H7504)
- **Sep 26, 2017:** Passed/agreed to in House: On agreeing to the resolution Agreed to by recorded vote: 230 - 190 (Roll no. 533).(text: CR H7499-7500)
- **Sep 26, 2017:** On agreeing to the resolution Agreed to by recorded vote: 230 - 190 (Roll no. 533). (text: CR H7499-7500)
- **Sep 26, 2017:** Motion to reconsider laid on the table Agreed to without objection.
- **Sep 25, 2017:** Introduced in House
- **Sep 25, 2017:** The House Committee on Rules reported an original measure, H. Rept. 115-331, by Mr. Burgess.
- **Sep 25, 2017:** The resolution provides a structured rule for H.R. 2824, and closed rule for H.R. 2792. It provides for 1 hour of general debate for both bills.
- **Sep 25, 2017:** Placed on the House Calendar, Calendar No. 86.

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
