Native Youth and Tribal Officer Protection Act

This bill extends tribal jurisdiction over certain crimes.

Specifically, the bill extends tribal jurisdiction over the following crimes:

- violence committed against a child by a caregiver;
- violence against law enforcement officers involved in preventing, investigating, arresting, or prosecuting a person for domestic violence, dating violence, or child violence;
- attempted dating violence or domestic violence; or
- threatened dating violence or domestic violence.

In addition, the bill reauthorizes through FY2022 grants to tribal governments for exercising tribal criminal jurisdiction for those crimes.

Actions Timeline

- **Jun 15, 2021:** Referred to the Subcommittee for Indigenous Peoples of the United States.
- **Apr 22, 2021:** Referred to the Subcommittee on Health.
- **Apr 21, 2021:** Introduced in House
- **Apr 21, 2021:** Referred to the Committee on Natural Resources, and in addition to the Committees on Education and Labor, and Energy and Commerce, for a period to be subsequently determined by the Speaker, in each case for consideration of such provisions as fall within the jurisdiction of the committee concerned.
