Summary (as of Dec 13, 2022)

DHS Blue Campaign Enhancement Act

This bill requires the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) to expand its Blue Campaign, which coordinates DHS actions to identify and prevent human trafficking. The bill requires DHS to (1) provide web-based training for law enforcement and corrections personnel, and (2) establish an advisory board for the campaign.

Actions Timeline

- **Dec 13, 2022:** Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs. Reported by Senator Peters with an amendment in the nature of a substitute. With written report No. 117-250.
- **Dec 13, 2022:** Placed on Senate Legislative Calendar under General Orders. Calendar No. 634.
- **Nov 3, 2021:** Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs. Ordered to be reported with an amendment in the nature of a substitute favorably.
- **Oct 18, 2021:** Introduced in Senate
- **Oct 18, 2021:** Read twice and referred to the Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs.
