Summary (as of Nov 28, 2022)

Improving Government for America's Taxpayers Act

This bill requires the Government Accountability Office (GAO), in its annual report to Congress, to consolidate matters for congressional consideration into one report, organized by policy topic, and to identify congressional oversight actions that can help agencies implement unimplemented priority recommendations. The GAO is also required to publish the above information and publish any known costs of unimplemented priority recommendations.

Actions Timeline

- **Nov 28, 2022:** Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs. Reported by Senator Peters with an amendment in the nature of a substitute. With written report No. 117-213.
- **Nov 28, 2022:** Placed on Senate Legislative Calendar under General Orders. Calendar No. 566.
- **May 25, 2022:** Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs. Ordered to be reported with an amendment in the nature of a substitute favorably.
- **May 3, 2022:** Introduced in Senate
- **May 3, 2022:** Read twice and referred to the Committee on Homeland Security and Governmental Affairs.
