- **Apr 10, 2024:** The resolution provides for consideration of H.R. 7888 under a structured rule and H.R. 529, H. Res. 1112, and H. Res. 1117 each under a closed rule. The rule provides for two hours of general debate on H.R. 7888 and one hour of general debate on H.R. 529, H. Res. 1112, and H. Res. 1117. Motion to recommit provided on H.R. 7888 and H.R. 529.
- **Apr 10, 2024:** Placed on the House Calendar, Calendar No. 69.
- **Apr 10, 2024:** Considered as privileged matter. (consideration: CR H2265-2272; text: CR H2265)
- **Apr 10, 2024:** DEBATE - The House proceeded with one hour of debate on H. Res. 1125.
- **Apr 10, 2024:** POSTPONED PROCEEDINGS - At the conclusion of debate on H. Res. 1125, the Chair put the question on ordering the previous question and by voice vote, announced that the ayes had prevailed. Ms. Leger Fernandez demanded the yeas and nays and the Chair postponed further proceedings until a time to be announced.

- **Apr 10, 2024:** On ordering the previous question Agreed to by the Yeas and Nays: 210 - 209 (Roll no. 107).
