Sets forth the rule for consideration of the bill (H.R. 1) to lower energy costs by increasing American energy production, exports, infrastructure, and critical minerals processing, by promoting transparency, accountability, permitting, and production of American resources, and by improving water quality certification and energy projects.

Actions Timeline

- **Mar 28, 2023:** Introduced in House
- **Mar 28, 2023:** The House Committee on Rules reported an original measure, H. Rept. 118-30, by Mr. Reschenthaler.
- **Mar 28, 2023:** Rule provides for consideration of H.R. 1 with 7 hours of general debate. Motion to recommit allowed. Measure will be considered read. Specified amendments are in order.
- **Mar 28, 2023:** Placed on the House Calendar, Calendar No. 11.
- **Mar 28, 2023:** Considered as privileged matter. (consideration: CR H1474-1484)
- **Mar 28, 2023:** DEBATE - The House proceeded with one hour of debate on H. Res. 260.
- **Mar 28, 2023:** POSTPONED PROCEEDINGS - At the conclusion of debate on H. Res. 260, the Chair put the question on ordering the previous question on H. Res. 260 and by voice vote, announced that the ayes had prevailed. Mr. McGovern demanded the yeas and nays and the Chair postponed further proceedings until a time to be announced.
- **Mar 28, 2023:** Considered as unfinished business. (consideration: CR H1484-1485)
- **Mar 28, 2023:** On ordering the previous question Agreed to by the Yeas and Nays: 218 - 203 (Roll no. 165).
